This morning's anthem is a wonderful elaboration on all the ways that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8). As the choir sings, consider that we can rely on Christ with complete faith in all the circumstances of our lives—in work, rest, waking, sleeping, calm and storm. He is still the Lord of Love, the Lord of Healing, the Lord of Creation, the Lord of Life and Prince of Peace "who stooped for us from heaven." The measure of his love and reaching for us is awesome.

The music composed by Craig Courtney for this profound text underscores it beautifully, always enhancing and never overwhelming it. Some portions are sung in unison, some in two-parts and some in four parts. Courtney has warmed and enhanced both the music and text with the addition of a part for horn.

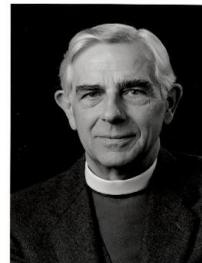
The text was penned by the Reverend Timothy Dudley-Smith (b.1926), retired Anglican bishop and the author of about 400 hymn

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texts; there are 18 in our green hymnal. Dudley-Smith is honorary vice-president of the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland and a Fellow of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada and a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music. In 2003, he was awarded honors by Queen Elizabeth for 'services to hymnody,' and in 2009, he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity from the University of Durham.

According to author David Oestreich, Dudley-Smith's hymns never seem common or trite because of his mastery of various meters, his command of rhyme (both exact and approximate), and his gift for subtle yet effective imagery. Instead, they allow the worshipper to express praise in a form both contemporary and timeless.

Composer Craig Courtney's biography has been shared several times in these notes. To review, he began playing the piano at age three and the cello at the age of eleven. He was on the faculty of the famed Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, serving as piano teacher and accompanist for the woodwind and brass department.

It was while serving in the music ministry of the Salzburg International Baptist Church, that Courtney began directing a church choir and composing sacred choral music. In 1985, his compositions came to the attention of John Ness Beck (founder of Beckenhorst Press), through the publication of his anthem, *Thy Will Be Done*. Following John Ness Beck's death, Courtney was appointed as staff composer and editor of Beckenhorst Press.
